### Gateways 2017

Harrisville juniors have been busy the last few weeks writing resumes, cover letters, filling out job applications and practicing interviewing skills. Why all the fuss about teaching job search skills? High schools in St. Lawrence County realize that it is vital for all students to learn interviewing skills, how to write a resume and cover letter, and fill out a job application. On Wednesday, March 22<sup>nd</sup>, @ SUNY Canton College, 80+ employers spent the morning meeting with seniors from across St. Lawrence County in a "mock interview" session. Students chose at least three employers in a career field of their interest to sit down and spend 15-20



minutes in a practice interview.

Why is this event so important? Just ask the employers. They are giving up one day of work (which equals money out of their pocket) to spend one full day working with juniors and seniors to emphasize the importance of being prepared to enter the workforce. Regardless of the career path a student chooses after high school

With the new school year drawing near, for some students entering the seventh grade this fall, there is probably some apprehension about moving into middle school. It is in hopes that the evening will help both students and parents become aware of what to expect in 7th grade. ### Progress Reports & Report Cards:

- The 30-week marking period will end on Friday, April 7. Report cards will be sent home with students on Friday, April 14.
- The 35-week marking period ended on Friday, May 12. Progress reports will be sent home with students on Friday, May 19.
- If you have questions or concerns with regard to your child's grades at any time, please feel free to contact your child's teacher by phone or e-mail. If you would like a parent-teacher conference, feel free to contact the guidance office to set up a meeting.

<u>GUIDANCE RECORDS</u> – Class of 2011: We only keep guidance records for six years. That means we will be destroying guidance records from the class of 2011 in June of this year. (NOTE: we still keep a transcript.) Any member of that class is welcome to call before June 30, 2017 to have his or her folder as a keepsake.

<u>IMMUNIZATION RECORDS</u> – Class of 2007: Harrisville Central School keeps immunization records for 10 years. We will be destroying immunization records from the class of 2007 at the end of June this year. Any member of that class is welcome to call Mrs. Chartrand, (315) 543-2920, to obtain their immunization record. Requests for immunization records must be made **PRIOR TO June 30**, 2017.

<u>ATTENDANCE/EXCUSES</u> - Many students in grades Pre-K-12 owe excuses for days they were either absent or tardy from school. Please send in these excuses as soon as possible, as the school is required by NYS law to keep them on file to validate whether or not absences are excused or unexcused.

**<u>PERFECT ATTENDANCE</u>** – Middle school & high school students will be awarded a Perfect Attendance Certificate only if they have attended daily for the full day with no absences, tardiness or early dismissals.

<u>COURSE FAIL LETTERS</u> – Letters will be mailed home on a rolling basis as the guidance office is notified of course failures at the end of the school year. Please call the guidance office if you have questions about the option of summer school.

### Honor Roll:

- To qualify for the **High Honor Roll**, a student must have an average of 90.0 or above in all academic subjects and have passed all courses during that report period with no incompletes.

- To qualify for **Honor Roll**, a student must have an average of at least 85.0, but below 90.0, and have passed all courses taken during that report period with no incompletes.

- A failing grade in physical education will cause the student to be ineligible for the Honor/High Honor Roll. Honor roll eligibility depends on the marking period (term) grade, not the examination grade.

### SUMMER SCHOOL :

Any student in grades 9-12 who fails a required course should consider attending summer school this summer. Because of graduation requirements, it is extremely difficult to avoid scheduling conflicts, an overload of classes or an additional year of high school if you do not go to summer school for a failed course. The policy at HCS is as follows:

A student must have passed two quarters of work in Harrisville <u>and</u> the summer session **OR** attain an average grade that is passing when two thirds of the Harrisville's final grade is averaged with one third of the summer school grade.

The guidance office at HCS will handle summer school registration for students who would like to take a course at either Gouverneur Regional Summer School or Carthage Central Secondary Summer School. Specific information about summer school registration and deadlines will be posted on the school website and outside the guidance office on the bulletin board. Students may also pick up information in the guidance office.

### \*\* THERE WILL BE NO SUMMER SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION PROVIDED TO EITHER LOCATION\*\*

Students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to summer school.

## Talking With Our Children

It is difficult to ignore the uncertainty that looms over our local community and the world as a whole. Many of us are questioning how do we raise successful and responsible children in a society that is divided by hate, plagued with drugs, and is struggling to keep up with the demands for quality mental health services. Unfortunately there is not a magic answer nor is there a guarantee, but we can start by talking with our children and building healthy skills at an early age.

I am frequently asked "When should I start talking to my kids about substance use?" My answer is as soon as possible. With younger children, we lay the ground work by teaching them to communicate using "I" statements and being assertive so they have the skills they need to "Just Say NO" later on. We teach them about making healthy choices, both with how they take care of their bodies and the risks they take. Children need to be encouraged to recognize the natural high they get when they try something new, get a good grade, or accomplish a goal so they won't go looking for that high in unhealthy ways later on. Children are concrete thinkers, so whatever we tell them needs to correlate with the life experience they have at that age.

As our children get older, we can take advantage of those teachable moments in life. If we are watching TV or a movie or in the community with our children and there is substance use, point it out and see what they think about it. Ask open ended questions and really listen to what they have to say. Explain in an age appropriate manner what addiction is and the different consequences that come with substance use. Make your family's rules and consequences clear about substance use so there will be no misunderstandings. Parents sometimes feel as though they are being hypocritical by telling their children to not drink or use substances because of their own personal experiences. Our society is much different; the substances available are much more dangerous and they are marketed towards young adults. Because of these reasons, we need to explain that experimental use is more dangerous now than it was for adults at their age. Our children are our future and we need to do our part to keep them healthy and safe.


