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General Information

Integrated Pest Management

The school is required to maintain a list of parents, guardians, and staff who wish to receive 48 hour prior notification of pesticide applications at relevant facilities and the procedures on how to register with the school to be on a list for notification. This notice shall be made available at the beginning of summer school and at the beginning and end of each school year.

Harrisville Central School did not use any products that required prior written notification during the 2015-2016 school year.

If you would like to obtain information about products applied, including warnings that appear on the label of pesticide used, or would like to be placed on our notification list, please contact Rick Chartrand, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds, during normal business hours at 543-2920.

Asbestos Notification

In accordance with the Federal EPA Asbestos Hazard Emergency Response Act (AHERA), all public and private school PreK-12 in the United States are required to inspect their facilities for asbestos. An additional requirement of the regulation is that parents and staff are to be informed that the inspection was done. Harrisville Central School has been inspected for both friable and non-friable materials that contain asbestos. All asbestos has been removed from the district's buildings.

Physical Examinations

Physical examinations for students participating in extracurricular sports activities are valid for one year from the date of the last examination, unless a student has had an illness or injury that has required medical attention. In such instance, a statement from the treating healthcare provider giving permission to participate must be submitted to the school nurse and reviewed by the school physician before the student can participate in physical education and/or sports activities again.

Parent and student cooperation with this matter is important for the student's welfare and for compliance with Section X regulations.

Physical exams are also MANDATED for students in Pre-K or Kindergarten and grades 2,4,7, and 10. Notices regarding this were sent home in the spring of last school year. Parents have 30 days from the 1st day of school to provide proof of a physical exam to the school nurse.

Physical Education Excuses

Four years of satisfactory Physical Education is required for graduation by the New York State Educations Department. Physical Education is also required for all elementary students. The school nurse can approve occasional excuses from physical education activities. Prolonged excuses must be written by a physician. If your child has a health problem and cannot participate in gym, please be sure a note is filed with the nurse. A physician's note stating that the child may return is needed after a prolonged illness or injury.

Body Mass Index

During physical exams, height and weight are measured and body mass index (BMI) is calculated. A summary of this data is reported in a survey to the New York State Department of Health. No names of individual information is sent. If you prefer to have your child's data excluded, please con tact the school nurse, Kelly Avallone, at 543-2592.

Dental Health Certificate

New York State <u>requests</u> that the students enrolled in pre-kindergarten, kindergarten, and grades 2, 4, 7, and 10 present a dental health certificate. This certificate must indicate that the child is in fit condition of dental health to permit attendance at public school. REMINDER — Academic Policy for Extra Curricular Activities

A student participating in <u>ANY</u> extra-curricular activity must maintain a passing grade in all classes to remain eligible to participate. If a student is failing ANY class at one of the 5 week marking periods, the following consequences will be enforced:

The student will have <u>two weeks</u> to bring <u>all</u> classes up to passing. If after two weeks the student is still failing any class, they become ineligible to participate with activities, games or events associated with the extracurricular activity. The student is responsible to provide to the Advisor, Coach, Principal or Athletic Director; written proof that they are passing <u>ALL</u> classes to be fully reinstated with the extra-curricular activity. It is expected that while ineligible, the student will continue to practice, plan and attend meetings, so to maintain their involvement with the group.

To apply for free and reduced price meals, submit a Free Meals/Milk Eligibility Letter received from the Office of Temporary and Disability Assistance OR complete only one application for your household using the instructions.. PRIVACY ACT STATEMENT

Privacy Act Statement: This explains how we will use the information you give us.

The Richard B. Russell National School Lunch Act requires the information on this application. You do not have to give the information, but if you do not, we cannot approve your child for free or reduced price meals. You must include the last four digits of the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. With the ongoing drug epidemic and domestic violence concerns many children are being removed from their homes and placed in foster care. There are many times when family members will step up and take custody of these children, but there are also times when these children have nobody and they end up in foster care. Currently, Lewis County has seven open foster care and adoptive homes of which two of these homes are only used for temporary respite. At this time, all of our foster homes are full and unable to take on any more children. When this occurs, the department is forced to place children in homes outside of our agency including the Children's Home of Jefferson County, the House of the Good Shepherd, etc. It is our goal to recruit more foster homes so that the children who need to be placed are able to remain in their home town, near family and within their school district. This does not happen every time, but we do try to make this transition as easy as possible for these children as they have already been through so much. It can be very disruptive and upsetting for children to have to move to a new and unfamiliar home, let alone a home that is outside of the county.
