## **SENIORS & ALUMNI: Scholarship Opportunities**

### **Norbert L. Gazin Education Fund**

Applications are now available for the Norbert L. Gazin Education Fund (seniors and current college students may apply). The Bush and Gazin applications will be available in the guidance office on February 1st. **The deadline to apply is 12:00 (Noon) on March 27, 2019.**

Completed applications should be turned into the guidance office at Harrisville Central School by the deadline date. No late or incomplete applications will be considered. **It is the student's responsibility to make sure all parts of the application are in by the deadline date.**

### **Requirements:**

#### 1. Applicant Must:

- A. Be born in Lewis County or parents resided in Lewis County at the time of birth
- B. Be a resident of Lewis County for at least five (5) years prior to application
- C. Be a graduate (or will be a graduate) of a Lewis County High School
- D. Have no felony convictions

#### 2. Priority will be given to eligible applicants enrolling or enrolled in schools of:

- A. Engineering
- B. Agriculture
- C. Forestry

3. A. High School applicants who are not declaring one of the priority majors must have a minimum of an 80 overall G.P.A. to apply for the Gazin Scholarship.  
Students with a lower GPA are allowed to apply; however, please be aware that an 80 is our guideline.)

- B. High School applicants who are declaring PRIORITY (engineering, agriculture or forestry) major must have a minimum of an overall 75 G.P.A. to apply for the Gazin Scholarship.

- C. Alumni may apply for the Gazin Scholarship each year, however; they must have a minimum of a 2.5 **cumulative** G.P.A. and submit the most recent transcript (fall 2018).

- D. Graduate students may apply for the Gazin Scholarship if they qualify for the **priority majors only:** Engineering, agriculture or forestry AND have a minimum G.P.A. of 3.0

The Gazin Scholarship is becoming more competitive each year. A minimum G.P.A. criteria has been established to apply, however, the committee reserves the right to determine winners each year to maintain the integrity of the scholarship. Winners will be notified by July 1, 2019.

## Austin Scholarship

The Austin Scholarship is provided by the estate of Doris E. Austin. It is intended for graduating seniors AND former graduates of Harrisville Central School who are continuing their education in nursing or any allied medical field. The scholarship is in the amount of \$1000 per year and may be reapplied for in subsequent years if the applicant remains in college. If a senior is awarded this scholarship, it will be presented at graduation.

To apply, you must complete a brief application, submit a resume, and write an essay on why you want to enter the medical field. **The deadline to apply for this scholarship is Friday, May 17, 2019.** Applications can be picked up in the guidance office and completed applications should be returned to the guidance office at Harrisville Central School.

## JUNIORS

Most of the juniors who took the PSAT this fall will take an SAT and/or ACT college entrance examination in the spring of 2019. **The guidance office will meet with juniors to discuss the spring SAT and ACT process and registration at a later date.**

## Juniors - SAT/ACT Testing Deadlines

The time has come for college bound juniors to register for the SAT and/or ACT exams to be held in June. (Harrisville Central provides busing to June test dates only.) Registration materials may be picked up in the guidance office. Students can register online (please notify the guidance office if you need assistance). See Mrs. Carr if you are unsure if you should take either of these standardized tests. Many students opt to take both exams in order to give colleges more than one kind of testing information. Students receiving free/reduced lunches qualify for a fee waiver and must see Mrs. Carr before registering for either test.

### Gateways 2019

Harrisville juniors have been busy the last few weeks writing resumes, cover letters, filling out job applications and practicing interviewing skills. Why all the fuss about teaching job search skills? High schools in St. Lawrence County realize that it is vital for all students to learn interviewing skills, how to write a resume and cover letter, and fill out a job application. On Wednesday, March 20, @ SUNY Canton College, 80+ employers spent the morning meeting with seniors from across St. Lawrence County in a “mock interview” session. Students chose at least three employers in a career field of their interest to sit down and spend 15-20 minutes in a practice interview.

Why is this event so important? Just ask the employers. They are giving up one day of work (which equals money out of their pocket) to spend one full day working with juniors and seniors to emphasize the importance of being prepared to enter the workforce. Regardless of the career path a student chooses after high school graduation, one thing is certain - competition for all types of jobs is tougher than ever. ### Post Graduates

The faculty & staff @ HCS take great pride in you, and everyone likes to know where you have been and what you have accomplished since high school graduation.

Maybe you have a great job, achieved success at the college or military levels, traveled the world, received special commendation, own your own business or have given back to the community. Whatever your success may be, we would like to hear about it! It's also important for our high school students at Harrisville Central School to know that you can graduate from a small school and still go on and do great things.

So ... keep us in the loop! We are proud of all of you and what you have accomplished.

**GUIDANCE RECORDS** – **Class of 2013:** We only keep guidance records for six years. That means we will be destroying guidance records from the class of 2013 in June of this year. (NOTE: we still keep a transcript.) **Any member of that class is welcome to call before June 30, 2019 to have his or her folder as a keepsake.**

**IMMUNIZATION RECORDS** – **Class of 2009:** Harrisville Central School keeps immunization records for 10 years. We will be destroying immunization records from the **class of 2009** at the end of June this year. Any member of that class is welcome to call Mrs. Chartrand, (315) 543-2920, to obtain their immunization record. Requests for immunization records must be made **PRIOR TO June 30, 2019.**

**PERFECT ATTENDANCE** – Middle school & high school students will be awarded a Perfect Attendance Certificate only if they have attended daily for the full day with no absences, tardiness or early dismissals.

**FINAL REPORT CARDS** - The final report cards for grades 7-12 will be sent home **during the week of July 1<sup>st</sup> – 5<sup>th</sup>.**  
**NOTE: If your son or daughter has any outstanding obligations such as: lunch charges, library books, textbooks, excuses, etc., the final report cards will not be mailed home, but held in the main office until all obligations are met.**

**COURSE FAIL LETTERS** – Letters will be mailed home on a rolling basis as the guidance office is notified of course failures at the end of the school year. Please call the guidance office if you have questions about the option of summer school.

#### **Honor Roll:**

To qualify for the **High Honor Roll**, a student must have an average of 90.0 or above in all academic subjects and have passed all courses during that report period with no incompletes.

To qualify for **Honor Roll**, a student must have an average of at least 85.0, but below 90.0, and have passed all courses taken during that report period with no incompletes.

A failing grade in physical education will cause the student to be ineligible for the Honor/High Honor Roll. Honor roll eligibility depends on the marking period (term) grade, not the examination grade.

#### **SUMMER SCHOOL :**

Any student in grades 9-12 who fails a required course should consider attending summer school this summer. Because of graduation requirements, it is extremely difficult to avoid scheduling conflicts, an overload of classes or an additional year of high school if you do not go to summer school for a failed course. The policy at HCS is as follows:

*A student must have passed two quarters of work in Harrisville **and** the summer session **OR** attain an average grade that is passing when two thirds of the Harrisville's final grade is averaged with one third of the summer school grade.*

The guidance office at HCS will handle summer school registration for students who would like to take a course at either Gouverneur Regional Summer School or Carthage Central Secondary Summer School. Specific information about summer school registration and deadlines will be posted on the school website and outside the guidance office on the bulletin board. Students may also pick up information in the guidance office.

**\*\* THERE WILL BE NO SUMMER SCHOOL TRANSPORTATION PROVIDED TO EITHER LOCATION\*\***

**Students are responsible for arranging their own transportation to summer school.**

**Attendance: Please read carefully**  
**This information applies to students in grades Pre-K-12.**

**Immediately upon return to school following an absence, a student must present a note from his or her parent(s)/guardian(s) to the attendance office, as required by law, explaining his or her absence.**

When a 7-12 student arrives to school late, they should sign the log sheet in the guidance office and receive a pass from Mrs. Chartrand for attendance purposes. Elementary students should sign in with Mrs. Rebb. **Excuses are to be turned in to the attendance secretary at that time.**

If a student is excused from school early for medical appointments or other reasons, the student must bring or send a note signed by a parent or guardian to the elementary office (Pre-K-6 students) or the guidance office (7-12 students) in the morning.

Students in grades 7-12 must sign out in the guidance office before they leave for the appointment and then sign in when returning to the building.

Pre-K-5 students must sign out in the elementary office before they leave.

**PLEASE KEEP PHONE CALLS REQUESTING EARLY RELEASE OF STUDENTS FROM SCHOOL FOR EMERGENCIES ONLY.** Sending a note in first thing in the morning is the best way to handle early releases. This way you, school personnel and the student are all on the same page early in the day **and there are no class time interruptions.** Your cooperation is greatly appreciated.



**IMPORTANT NOTICE TO PARENTS REGARDING PHONE CALLS:**

**Due to an overwhelming amount of phone calls to school by parents requesting early dismissals for students, parents are now asked to please limit phone calls for early dismissal to absolute emergencies only.**

**Effective immediately, if a parent calls to have their child excused early from school, the parent will be asked to come in to the school at the time they pick up their child and submit a written excuse.** New York State law indicates that the school must have a written excuse on file for all student absences, excusals and tardiness. Unfortunately, the majority of our parents have not been following up with written excuses as promised.

***The important thing to note is that when last minute phone calls are made to school for a student's early dismissal, classes are interrupted and the whole classroom loses precious classroom instruction.***

**Again, to make it fair to everyone, students should submit all excuses first thing in the morning and parents should limit phone calls to emergency situations only. Your cooperation is greatly appreciated by all. Thank you.**

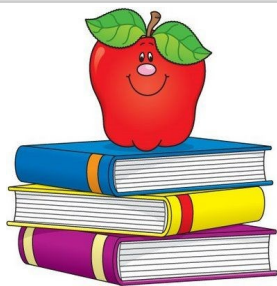

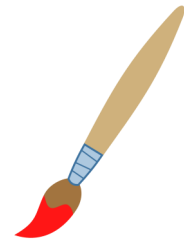

## National Honor Society & National Junior Honor Society

In my time as the adviser for both honor societies here at Harrisville Central School, I have been asked the following question, "What does it take to become a member of the National Honor Society and National Junior Society?"

This short article should help alleviate some of your questions. So here is a list of the criteria that is used to select middle school and high school students into this prestigious organization.

Shown below according to the NHS and NJHS constitution is the only criteria for selection.....

### **Article IX: Selection of Members:**

**Section 1.** To be eligible for membership the candidate must be a member of those classes (sophomore, junior, senior) designated as eligible in the chapter bylaws. (Freshmen [ninth graders] are not eligible.) Candidates must have been in attendance at the school the equivalent of one semester (Note 1).

**Section 2.** The national minimum standard for scholarship shall be cumulative scholastic average of at least 85 percent, B, or 3.0 (on a 4.0 scale) or the equivalent standard of excellence. Candidates shall then be evaluated on the basis of service, leadership, and character (Note 2).

**Section 3.** The selection of each member to the chapter shall be by a majority vote of the Faculty Council. Prior to notification of any candidates, the chapter adviser shall review with the principal the results of the Faculty Council's deliberations.

**Note 1.** Some candidates may be ineligible for induction because of the semester ruling. Many students, including students of military parents, are required to move with parents or guardians who have transferred in their work. The present school principal should seek a recommendation from the previous school principal or chapter adviser pursuant to the candidate's selection. On the basis of the recommendation from the previous school, the Faculty Council may waive the semester regulation.

**Note 2.** Local chapters may raise the cumulative GPA standard about the national minimum, or increase standards for the remaining selection criteria, apply them fairly and consistently, and include these standards in their locally published selection procedures.

At HCS the minimum standard for scholarship shall be a cumulative scholastic average of at least 88 percent for the equivalent standard of excellence. Candidates shall then be evaluated on the basis of service, citizenship, leadership, and character.

Once inducted into the Society, students must maintain a cumulative scholastic average of at least 90 percent (NHS) and a cumulative scholastic average of at least 88 percent (NJHS). Shown below according to the NHS and NJHS constitution is the only criteria for a student who fails to maintain the academic standards for membership...

### **Article X: Discipline and Dismissal:**

**Section 1.** The Faculty Council, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the National Honor Society, shall determine the procedure for dismissal. A written description of the dismissal procedure shall be available to interested parties (Note 3).

**Section 2.** Members who fall below the standards that were the basis for their selection shall be promptly warned in writing by the chapter adviser and given a reasonable amount of time to correct the deficiency, except that in the case of flagrant violation of school rules or the law, a member does not have to be warned.

**Section 3.** The Faculty Council shall determine when an individual has exceeded a reasonable number of warnings.

**Section 4.** In all cases of pending dismissal, a member shall have a right to a hearing before the Faculty Council. (Note: This hearing is required and is considered "due process" for all members.)

**Section 5.** For purposes of dismissal, a majority vote of the Faculty Council is required.

**Section 6.** A member who has been dismissed may appeal the decision of the Faculty Council to the principal and thereafter under the same rules for disciplinary appeals in the school district.

**Section 7.** NASSP shall hear no appeals in dismissal cases.

**Note 3.** To maintain compliance, all local procedures must conform to the full provisions of this article. Faculty Councils can consider disciplinary actions that are less severe than dismissal if circumstances warrant.
